This course explores the history, politics, and recent literature on the formation of nations and the development of nationalism. Earlier forms of political organization are investigated as well as the formation of empires and modern nations. Theories of the nation have moved from ideas of their essential, primordial quality to a more cultural, discursive approach emphasizing the role of imagination and invention in the social construction of modern nations. These theoretical advances have been developed primarily by historians and literary analysts, but in recent years social science thinking on nationalism has borrowed freely, often critically, from the emerging literature. We will both develop a narrative of the emergence of nations and explore some of the ways in which social science has employed and developed the body of theory on nationalism, looking at paradigms taken from international relations, identity theory, anthropology, and various psychological theories through case studies from around the world. In addition to academic readings, we will watch and discuss pertinent documentary films and historical movies.

Course Requirements:

- **Participation:** Undergraduate students are required to attend all the lectures and discussions, complete the assigned reading, and participate in discussions.
- Midterm Exam: A midterm take-home examination (6-8 pages, typed, double-spaced). (Due: February 23).
- Film Review: A review of one or several of the assigned films in terms of their contribution to understanding nationalism (4-6 pages, typed, double-spaced). (Due: March 31).
- **Final Paper:** A final take-home examination or paper, a short synthetic research paper or "thinkpiece" (8-10 pages, typed, double-spaced), that uses the readings, lectures, films, and discussions, as well as any outside reading the student might wish to include. The paper should demonstrate that you have read, understood, and can critically employ the material in the course. Graduate students will write a slightly longer final paper (15-20 pages) and will use additional readings. (**Due: April 24**).

Class Format:

The course meets for two lectures and one discussion group per week from January 4 to April 18, 2023.
